SUBJECT: Signage

#### Introduction

The Conservation Committee has deployed significant quantities of signage on town trails and open space. With the adoption of the Dog Ordinance amendments, signage notifying trail users of policy is advisable to promote compliance. At this time, a comprehensive review of greenbelt signage policy may be appropriate to preserve town branding and present uniform signage on town open space.

## **Existing Signage program**

Below is a summary of current signage practice.

## Metal signs

The town has purchased metal signs with logo which are the most common and durable in use. These include the  $8\,1/2\,x\,11$ " trailhead sign and a variety of 4" trail signs. The signs are purchased in quantity to reduce costs.





## Laminated signs

The town has  $8\,1/2$ " x 11" laminated paper that can be used with a laser printer to make signage. This approach has been extensively used to quickly make and post signage. A standardized template that includes the greenbelt logo and Conservation Committee referenced is the base for the signage. Over 2 dozen signs have been made.
























































The Town has begun deploying colored diamond trail markers at Winnick Woods and Canterbury to aide in navigation on properties with a dense trail network. At this time, we are out of orange markers and have blue (250), yellow (150) and white (120).

## Wood Signage


The town has installed 2 large wooden signs at "destination" locations. These signs are at Winnick Woods and Cliff House Beach Park. The signs are in the range of  $2\,1/2' \times 2"$  in size with a dark green background, logo and good lettering.



# Goals for Signage

To begin the signage review, the Conservation Committee may want to agree on overall signage goals before discussing the specifics of design. Some elements to consider follow.

- •Branding The Conservation Committee has invested a decade plus into creating a consistent brand to educate trail users that the trail is maintained by the Town of Cape Elizabeth. This is important to maintain financial and political support for public trail policy.
- •Town wide open space consistency Again, the Conservation Committee has been working to maintain some consistency in trail signage across all town

maintained trails. This not only supports branding, but also (hopefully) more success in trail users abiding by use policies.

- •Restraint The Conservation Committee has tried to balance the need for signage while also avoiding sign clutter. A review of signage may make it possible to replace multiple existing signs with a comprehensive sign to be installed on multiple trails. Decisions about what to include on such a sign and how large it should be will be needed.
- •Modernize The Conservation Committee has discussed elements to include on a sign, how signs coordinate online, etc. This review is timely for considering new approaches.
- •Dog Ordinance Signage that supports newly clarified dog rules on town open space should be installed soon. (The new ordinance took effect October 9, 2019) What elements of town policy should be on the signage? Voice and Site control, on leash within 10' of a parking lot, no more than 3 unleashed dogs, disposal of pet waste, failure to obey rules may result in loss of off leash privileges, others?
