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ARTICLE I. Purpose, Authority, Scope, Definitions.

37 Sec. 16-1-1. Purpose. This ordinance is designed to promote the health, safety, 38 convenience and general welfare of the Inhabitants of the Town of Cape Elizabeth by 39 encouraging and ensuring sound planning, the use of the environment under healthful 40 conditions, the imaginative and orderly use of land, compliance with the goals and 41 objectives of the Comprehensive Plan, and development that fits harmoniously into the 42 existing natural environment and rural character. To this end, in evaluating any proposed 43 subdivision of land within the Town of Cape Elizabeth, the Planning Board shall determine whether such subdivision will meet the standards set forth in this Chapter and: 44 45 46 (a) Will not result in undue water or air pollution. In making this determination it 47 shall consider at least: the elevation of land above sea level and its relation to the

1	flood plains, the nature of soils and sub-soils and their ability too adequately
2	support waste disposal; the slope of the land and its effect on effluents; the
3	availability of streams for disposal of effluents; and the applicable state and local
4	health and water resources regulations;
5	
6	(b) Has sufficient water available for the reasonably foreseeable needs of the
7	subdivision;
8	
9	(c) Will not cause an unreasonable burden on an existing public water supply, if one
10	is to be utilized;
11	
12	(d) Will not cause an unreasonable soil erosion or reduction in the capacity of the
13	land to hold water so that a dangerous or unhealthy condition may result;
14	
15	(e) Will not cause unreasonable highway or public road congestion or unsafe
16	conditions with respect to use of the highways or public roads, alone or in
17	conjunction with existing or contemplated road use;
18	
19	(f) Will provide for adequate sewage waste disposal;
20	
21	(g) Will not cause an unreasonable burden on the ability of a municipality to dispose
22	of solid waste and sewage if municipal services are to be utilized;
23	
24 25	(h) Will not have an undue adverse effect on the scenic or natural beauty of the area,
25 26	scenic vistas, aesthetics, wildlife habitat, historic sites or rare and irreplaceable
26 27	natural areas; or any public rights for physical or visual access to the shoreline;
27 28	(i) Is in conformance with these Subdivision Regulations, the Zoning Ordinance
28 29	(i) Is in conformance with these Subdivision Regulations, the Zoning Ordinance,
29 30	Comprehensive Plan for the Town of Cape Elizabeth and the requirements for huilding and development in flood beyond errors get forth in Article VI of Chapter

32 33	(j) The applicant has adequate financial and technical capacity to meet the above
33 34	(j) The applicant has adequate manetar and technical capacity to meet the above stated standards;

36	(k) Whenever situated, in whole or in part, within 250 feet of any water body, stream,
37	brook, wetland as defined in the Zoning Ordinance, or tidal waters, will not
38	adversely affect the quality of such body of water or unreasonably affect the
39	shoreline of such body of water;
40	shorenne of such body of water,
41	(1) Will not, alone or in conjunction with existing activities, adversely affect the
42	quality of ground water;
43	
44	(m)The applicant will determine, based on the Federal Emergency Management
45	Agency's Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps and Flood Insurance Rate Maps,
46	whether the subdivision is in a flood prone area. If the subdivision, or any part of
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it, is in such an area, the applicant will determine the 100-year flood elevation and flood hazard boundaries within the subdivision. The proposed subdivision plan shall include a condition of plat approval requiring that principal structures on lots in the subdivision shall be constructed with their lowest floor, including the basement, at least one foot above the 100-year flood elevation; and

(n) Will promote energy conservation and efficiency.

8 Sec. 16-1-2. Authority. These regulations This Ordinance shall apply to all land within
9 the limits of the Town of Cape Elizabeth, Cumberland County, Maine. They_and shall be
10 administered by the Planning Board of the Town of Cape Elizabeth, hereinafter called
11 "the Planning Board", and the Town's designated code enforcement staff., and the
12 registered professional engineer employed or retained by the Town who shall be its
13 lawful agents.

14 Sec. 16-1-3 Scope.

- 16 (a) Any person, firm, corporation or other legal entity proposing to sell, lease or 17 convey, or to offer or agree to sell, lease or convey, any land in a subdivision any 18 portion of which is within the limits of the Town of Cape Elizabeth, including 19 without limitation any unit within multiplex housing, as defined herein, shall first 20 submit such subdivision for approval by the Planning Board in accordance with 21 thisese Regulations Ordinance and shall record in the Cumberland County 22 Registry of Deeds a plan thereof bearing the approval of the Planning Board. 23 24 (b) No utility installations; no ditching, grading or construction of roads; no grading 25 of land or lots; and no construction of buildings shall be done on any part of the 26 proposed subdivision until a subdivision application has been submitted, reviewed 27 and finally approved as provided by this Ordinance.

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Sec. 16-1-4 Definitions.

In general, words and terms used in <u>this Ordinance these Regulations</u> shall have their
 customary dictionary meanings, but the following words and terms as used in <u>this</u>
 <u>Ordinance these Regulations</u> are defined as follows:

34 "Applicant" - the record owner, or a person having an interest in the land either through
 35 written option or contract.

36 "Access Road" - any road which includes (1) an <u>eighteen (18) feet</u>- wide traveled way,

37 (2) deeded and actual rights of public emergency access, and (3) year-round maintenance,

38 including snow plowing of the road, the responsibility of which is documented in a

39 binding written agreement if the road is not located within a public right-of-way.

40 "Arterial" - a road which is a major link with other communities. This road typically

41 | averages in excess of <u>three thousand (3,000)</u> trips per day with an average length of each

42 trip of more than one mile. Arterials accommodate residential, agricultural and most of

43 the Town's commercial development. Direct access by residential development should be

1 2	discouraged, and commercial access should be combined with adjacent commercial uses where feasible.
3 4	<u>"AASHTO"</u> - The American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, an organization that establishes transportation specifications.
5	"Board" - shall refer to Planning Board.
6 7	" Building Envelope " - The area within a lot where the main and accessory buildings shall be located.
8 9 10 11 12	"Cluster Development " - A type of subdivision development for single family detached dwellings, or a combination of single-family detached dwellings and multiplex dwellings, or a combination of both, where lot sizes, lot widths, and building setbacks are reduced below the minimum requirements of this ordinance and the land gained thereby is set aside as open space.
13 14	- "Code Enforcement Administrator" - the staff person designated to administer the Town's code enforcement operations.
15 16 17 18 19 20	"Collector" - a road <u>thatwhich</u> collects traffic from the most densely settled areas and typically connects to an adjacent community. This road averages in excess of 2,000 trips per day with an average length of each trip over more than one mile. Collectors are located in areas with a dense, suburban pattern of development. The design of collectors must provide heavy traffic flow capacity and protect sensitive scenic areas and neighborhoods. Direct access by single driveway should be discouraged.
21 22 23	"Dead-end road" - a road with a single, common means of ingress and egress. [Rev. eff. 7/13/94]
24 25	"Ditch" - a channel for conveying surface water outside the traveled way.
26 27 28 29	"Dwelling unit" - any part of a structure which, through sale or lease, is intended for human habitation, including single-family and multi-family housing, condominiums, apartments and time-share units.
30 31 32	"Easement"- a grant of one or more of the property rights by the property owner to and/or for use by the public, a corporation, or another person or entity. Examples of
33	easements include but are not limited to drainage, conservation, emergency access, pedestrian, utility, road and open space easements.

34 35 36 37	 pedestrian, utility, road and open space easements. "Emergency Access Lane"- a public or private paved road with a minimum width of eighteen (18) feet² which is not open to through vehicular traffic. This type of road may provide secondary emergency access to an area served by a dead-end road. [Rev. eff.

1 Natural Resources Conservation Service within the United States Department of 2 Agriculture; or (2) used for the production of agricultural products as defined in Title 7 3 M.R.S.A. Sec. 152, subsection 2. 4 "Feeder" - a road which connects local roads to other roads. This road is typically 5 densely developed and serves more than one-hundred (100) dwellings or approximately 6 one-thousand (1,000) trips per day. Feeders primarily serve residential traffic where 7 access by single driveway is common. 8 "Final Approval" - The status of an application once there has been a Planning Board 9 Decision, any conditions on the approval have been met, the recording plat has been signed and a performance guarantee has been accepted by the Town. 10 11 "Gutter" - a channel for conveying surface water along the edge of pavement. "Local Road" - a road that which provides direct access to adjacent residential land or 12 the Town center area. The local road is the most common road classification and carries a 13 low volume of trips in residential areas, although higher volumes are also common in the 14 15 Town center area. Local roads should be designed for slow speeds and frequent 16 pedestrian travel. 17 "Lot" - an area of land in one ownership, regardless of the dates or sources of acquisition thereof and regardless of the buildings and uses existing thereon, having definite 18 19 boundaries by recorded plan or deed and having an area of less than forty (40) acres. 20 "Manufactured Housing Unit" - structures, transportable in one or two-more sections, 21 which were constructed in a manufacturing facility and are transported to a building site 22 and designed to be used as dwellings when connected to the required utilities, including 23 the plumbing, heating, air conditioning and electrical systems contained therein. 24 "Manufactured Housing Park" - a parcel of land under unified ownership designed 25 and/or used to accommodate three or more manufactured housing units. 26 "Manufactured Housing Park Lot" - the area of land on which an individual home is 27 situated within a manufactured housing park and which is reserved for use by the 28 occupants of that home. 29 "MDOT" - The State of Maine Department of Transportation. 30 "M.R.S.A" - Maine Revised Statutes Annotated. 31 "MUCTD" - The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Device Standards. 32 "Multiplex Housing" - attached dwelling units, as defined in the Zoning Ordinance 33 (Chapter 19). 34 "Performance Guarantee" - any security that may be accepted by the Town to assure 35 that improvements required as part of an application for development will be completed 36 in compliance with the approved plans. 37 "Planner" - that person designated from time to time by the Town to assist the Planning 38 Board in its subdivision and site plan review. 39 "Planning Board Decision" - the Planning Board vote to approve or conditionally 40 approve the preliminary or final plan.

1 2	" Principal Structure " - any building other than one <u>that which</u> is used for purposes wholly incidental or accessory to the use of another building on the same premises.
3 4	" Private Road " - a road or way <u>that which provides access to more than one principal</u> structure and which is not owned by the Town.
5 6	" Resubdivision " - the replatting of all or part of the land included in a subdivision plan already approved by the Planning Board.
7 8 9 10 11	"Right-of-way"- (1) a strip of land acquired by reservation, dedication, forced dedication, prescription or condemnation and intended to be occupied by a road, crosswalk, railroad, electric transmission lines, oil or gas pipeline, water line, sanitary storm sewer, or other similar uses; (2) generally, the right of one to pass over the property of another.
12 13	" Road " - a public or private way for vehicular traffic however designated, serving more than one residential unit or more than one lot.
14 15 16 17 18 19	"Rural Connector" - A road <u>thatwhich</u> handles trips between different parts of Town and connects rural residential development to arterials. This road typically carries less than 1,000 trips per day with an average length of more than one (1) mile. Rural connectors are located in primarily rural residential areas and the rural character should be maintained. Access by residential 7 -development should preferably be by a local road, but may be from a single driveway.
20 21	"Sight Distance " - <u>See continuous and clear sight distance that meets the minimum</u> requirements in Section 16-3-2 (a) (1) of this Ordinance.
22 23 24	"Site Improvement" - all changes and construction required of a developmentsubdivision to be in compliance with Planning Board approval and Town Standards.
25 26 27	"Spaghetti lot" - Any lot in a proposed subdivision with shore frontage on a river, stream, brook, great pond, or coastal wetland, as these features are defined in Title 38, section 480-B, with a lot depth to shore frontage ratio greater than 5 (five) to 1 (one).
28 29 30 31 32 33 34	"Standard Boundary Survey" - A map of a quantity of real estate prepared by a professional land surveyor registered in the State of Maine and based on (1) adequate research to support a professional opinion of boundary location, (2) field work including an inspection of the real estate and (3) the preparation of a plan, drawn to scale and including property boundary lines, easements and rights-of-way and existing structures, suitable for recording.
35 36 37 38 39 40 41	"Structure" - Anything constructed or erected with a fixed location on or in the ground, or attached to something having a fixed location on or in the ground, including, but not limited to, buildings, mobile homes, retaining walls, billboards, signs, piers and floats. It does not include a wharf, fish weir or trap that may be licensed under Title 38, chapter 9. A new structure or structures includes any structures for which construction begins on or after September 23, 1988. The area included in the expansion of an existing structure is deemed to be a new structure for the purposes of the Subdivision Ordinance.

1	"Subdivision " - the division of a tract or parcel of land into <u>three (3)</u> or more lots within
2	any <u>five (5)</u> year period, which period begins after September 22, 1971, whether
3	accomplished by sale, lease, development, buildings or otherwise. <u>The term</u>
4	<u>"subdivision" also includes the division of a new structure or structures on a tract or</u>
5	<u>parcel of land into three (3) or more dwelling units within a five (5) year period, the</u>
6	<u>construction or placement of three (3) or more dwelling units on a single tract or parcel of</u>
7	<u>and the division of an existing structure or structures previously used for commercial or</u>
8	<u>industrial use into three (3) or more dwelling units within a five (5) year period.₅ provided</u>
9	that a division accomplished by devise, condemnation, order of court, gift to a person
10	related to the donor by blood, marriage or adoption, unless the intent of such gift is to
11	avoid the objectives of this Ordinance, or by transfer of any interest in land to the owner
12	of land abutting thereon, shall not be considered to create a lot or lots for the purpose of
13	this Ordinance.
14	A. In determining whether a tract or parcel of land is divided into <u>three (3)</u> or more
15	lots, the first dividing of such tract or parcel , unless otherwise exempted herein,
16	<u>shall be_is</u> considered to create the first <u>two (2)</u> lots and the next dividing of
17	either of said first two lots, by whomever accomplished, <u>unless otherwise</u>
18	<u>exempted herein, shall be_is</u> considered to create a <u>third-3rd lot</u> , unless:

37 38 39	(2) A division accomplished by condemnation does not create a lot or lots for the purposes of this definition, unless the intent of the transferor is to avoid the objectives of the Subdivision Ordinance.

10	brother, sister, child or grandchild related by blood, marriage or adoption. A
11	gift under this definition can not be given for consideration that is more than
12	one-half (1/2) the assessed value of the real estate.
13	(5) A division accomplished by a gift to a municipality if that municipality
14	accepts the gift does not create a lot or lots for the purposes of this definition,
15	unless the intent of the transferor is to avoid the objectives of the Subdivision
16	Ordinance.
17	(6) A division accomplished by the transfer of any interest in land to the owners
18	of land abutting that land does not create a separate lot does not create a lot or
19	lots for the purposes of this definition, unless the intent of the transferor is to
20	avoid the objectives of the Subdivision Ordinance. If the real estate exempt
21	under this paragraph is transferred within five (5) years to another person
22	without all of the merged land, then the previously exempt division creates a
23	lot or lots for the purposes of the Subdivision Ordinance.
24	(7) The grant of a bona fide security interest in an entire lot that has been
25	exempted from the definition of subdivision under subsection D above, or
26	subsequent transfer of that entire lot by the original holder of the security
27	interest or that person's successor in interest, does not create a lot for the
28	purposes of this definition, unless the intent of the transferor is to avoid the
29	objectives of the Subdivision Ordinance.
30 31 32	E. The division of a tract or parcel of land into three (3) or more lots and upon each of which lots permanent dwelling structures legally existed before September 23, 1971 is not a subdivision.
33 34 35	F. In determining the number of dwelling units in a structure, the provisions of the Subdivision Ordinance regarding the determination of the number of lots apply, including exemptions from the definition of a subdivision of land.
36	G. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Subdivision Ordinance, leased dwelling
37	units are not subject to subdivision review if the municipal reviewing authority
38	has determined that the units are otherwise subject to Site Plan Review under the
39	Zoning Ordinance.For the purposes of this section, a tract or parcel of land is
40	defined as all contiguous land in the same ownership, provided that lands located
41	on opposite sides of a public or private road shall be considered each a separate
42	tract or parcel of land unless such road was established by the owner of land on
43	both sides thereof.

16 17	"Town Engineer" - that person designated by the Town to provide engineering advice to the Planning Board in its subdivision and site plan review.
18 19	"Traveled Way" - that portion of a right-of-way which is regularly used for vehicular traffic.

If a subdivision is proposed for development in phases, no portion of the subdivision may be left out of the phasing plan. Sequence of construction of subdivision phases shall be determined. Each phase or, as applicable, sequence of phases shall preserve the standards of review of Sec. 16-3-1, with emphasis on emergency vehicle access. The <u>Planning</u> Board may impose such conditions as it deems necessary to assure the orderly development of the subdivision; to assure that all necessary improvements are made for each separate phase.

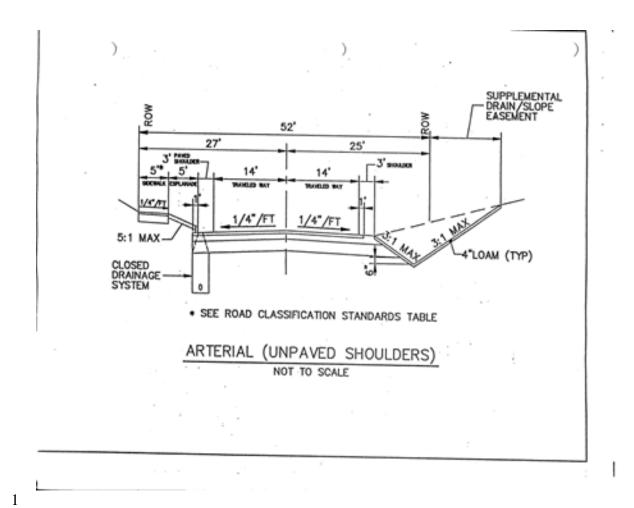
