Item # 52-2014 Consideration of proposed amendments to Chapter 12 of the Revised Code of Ordinances

Public Hearing Proposed Ordinance Amendment to Ban Smoking at Fort Williams Park

Intro – Councilor Ray, Chairman Ordinance Committee

Present – William Brownell, Chairman Fort Williams Advisory Commission

Chairman Sullivan opened the hearing to public comments at 7:14 p.m.

Jana Thompson, Opportunity Alliance and Healthy Maine Partnership

Ms. Thompson encouraged the adoption of this ordinance to promote healthy communities, joining several other towns adopting similar ordinances in public spaces.

Scott Clark, 6 Brentwood Road

Mr. Clark stated he is a smoker and said there is "nothing wrong with the messaging" particularly to children. He asked why e-cigarettes are excluded since there is "no scientific evidence" they are harmful to secondhand smoke.

Al Romano, 4 Fernwood Lane

Mr. Romano is "embarrassed" the town is considering the ordinance, it's impractical. Alternate solution is to ban smoking at public events at the park when there is a "greater density."

Emily Bugbee, 31 Cottage Farms Road

Ms. Bugbee favors the proposal for heath reasons, promoting health and wellness.

Bill Brownell, Chairman Fort Williams Advisory Commission

Mr. Brownell, on behalf of the commission, urged the council to adopt the proposal. The proposal is a result from litter in the park (e.g. along the Cliff Walk, at the bus drop off), secondhand smoke, and promotes providing a safe and healthy environment.

After hearing no further comments the hearing was closed at 7:25 p.m.

ORDERED the Cape Elizabeth Town Council adopts the recommendation of the Ordinance Committee to amend Chapter 12 Miscellaneous Offenses Article IV. Fort William Park Regulations Sec. 12-4-9 Smoking Prohibited and Sec. 12-4-10 Penalty.

Article IV. Fort Williams Park Regulations.

Sec. 12-4-9 Smoking Prohibited. Smoking in the Park is prohibited.

Smoking means the lighting, inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying of any cigar, cigarette, pipe, other tobacco product or e-cigarette, or carrying or having in one's possession any lighted object giving off smoke from tobacco or any other substance that emits smoke that is customarily used and intended for inhalation into the lungs.

<u>Tobacco or tobacco product</u> means any form of tobacco, including but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco or snuff, and any material or device used in the smoking, chewing or other form of tobacco consumption, including but not limited to cigarette papers or pipes.

Sec. 12-4–9- <u>10</u> **Penalty**. Any person found to have violated any provision in Article IV shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) per day of infraction to be recovered for the use of the Town. The Town shall also recover any fee that would have been assessed if a proper and timely permit had been granted. (Amended eff. 08/08/13)

ORDERED, the Cape Elizabeth Town Council amends the motion to the first paragraph of Sec. 12-4-9 Smoking Prohibited as follows:

Article IV. Fort Williams Park Regulations.

Sec. 12-4-9 Smoking Prohibited. Smoking in the Park is prohibited.

<u>Smoking</u> means the lighting, inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying of any cigar, cigarette, pipe, other tobacco product or e-cigarette, or carrying or having in one's possession any lighted object giving off smoke from tobacco or any other substance that emits smoke that is customarily used and intended for inhalation into the lungs.

Item # 53-2014 Consideration of Proposed Amendments to Chapter 19 of the Revised Code of Ordinances

Intro – Victoria Volent, Chairman Planning Board

Moved by James T. Walsh and Seconded by Katharine N. Ray

ORDERED, the Cape Elizabeth Town Council acknowledges receipt of the report from the Planning Board related to proposed amendments to Chapter 19 Zoning Ordinance and refers this proposal to the Ordinance Committee, see below.

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Chairman Sullivan opened the item for public comments.

Maynard Murphy, 24 Pilot Point Road

Mr. Murphy urged the council to seek comparisons from the proposal to what the ordinance is now. The proposal will be easing development closer to the sea and increasing pollution to the sea.

George Foley, 9 Pilot Point Road

Mr. Foley stated the current map pushed back to the top of the bank, a comparison from what the ordinance is now should be done. If passed the proposal won't be revisited for years and things can change.

Sheila Mayberry, 30 Trundy Road

Ms. Mayberry stated the planning board did an "incredible job" with the code enforcement officer's request. She asked what happens to the ledge areas; run off pollution will increase, larger homes and developments will be built closer to the water. Compare what we have now in the wetlands to what the proposal would include. Consider adding back the language for areas with ledge and cobblestone.

Deborah Murphy, 24 Pilot Point Road

Ms. Murphy provided handouts identifying the current and proposed normal high-water lines based on the current zoning map. The current zoning map should be consulted, the proposal will allow for more building.

Zoning Ordinance

Normal High Water Line Zoning Amendments

SEC. 19-1-3. DEFINITIONS

Highest Astronomical Tide: The elevation of the highest predicted astronomical tide, referenced to Mean Lower Low Water (MLLW) at Portland Head Light tide prediction station. This prediction is based on an adjustment from the Portland tidal station. The highest astronomical tide is based on the most recent National Tidal Datum Epoch (NTDE) as determined from time to time by the National Ocean Service, an office within the U.S. Department of Commerce, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Normal High Water Line: Adjacent to inland waters, the normal high water line shall be that line which is apparent from visible markings, changes in the character of soils due to prolonged action of the water or changes in vegetation, and which distinguishes between predominantly aquatic and predominantly terrestrial land. Areas contiguous with rivers and great ponds that support non-forested wetland vegetation and hydric soils and that are at the same or lower elevation as the water level of the river or great pond during the period of normal high-water are considered part of the river or great pond. Adjacent to tidal waters, the normal high water line shall be the topographic line located at the Highest Astronomical Tide, plus three (3) vertical feet upland.

SEC. 19-6-11. SHORELAND PERFORMANCE OVERLAY DISTRICT

A. Purpose

In order to maintain safe and healthful conditions; to prevent and control water pollution; to protect spawning grounds of fish, aquatic life, bird and other wildlife habitat; to protect archaeological and historic resources; to protect freshwater and coastal wetlands; to control building sites, placement of structures and land uses; to conserve shore cover; to protect visual, as well as actual, points of access to inland and coastal waters; to conserve

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natural beauty and open space; and to anticipate and respond to the impact of development in Shoreland areas, all land use activities within the Shoreland Performance Overlay District shall conform to the applicable land use standards in Sec. 19-8-2, Shoreland Performance Standards. This district is established in accordance with the provisions of 38 M.R.S.A. §435 et seq.

The Shoreland Performance Overlay District applies to all land within two hundred fifty (250) feet, horizontal distance, of the:

- normal high-water line of any great pond and the Spurwink River
- normal high water line of tidal waters;
- upland edge of a freshwater wetland and all land areas within seventy-five (75) feet, horizontal distance, of the normal high-water line of a stream. This district also applies to any structure built on, over or abutting a dock, wharf or pier, or other structure extending, or located below the normal high-water line of a water body or within a wetland. (Effective October 15, 2009) The Town has prepared a zoning map showing the Shoreland Performance Overlay District based on the best available information at a town wide scale. The actual boundaries of this district, however, shall be determined from a field engineering determination of the topographic line as defined above

Item # 54-2014 Segregation of Space in Police Station

ORDERED, the Cape Elizabeth Town Council allocates \$37,500 from the unallocated fund balance to segregate the surplus space at the police station, provide security improvements, fit out an area for the police department clerk and to repurpose the surplus space to be used by the Cape Elizabeth Historical Preservation Society while the library is removed in 2015. A determination will be made at a later date if the society and its collection and the municipal records it holds will be moved to another location after the library renovation is completed. ORDERED, the Cape Elizabeth Town Council established the following Policy for Naming of Non-school Facilities as presented.

Proposed Policy for Naming of Non-school Facilities

It is appropriate from time to time to name municipal facilities or a portion thereof for an individual, group or other entity in recognition of significant contributions of time, talent or treasure to the Town of Cape Elizabeth.

The town council shall consider such designations at a regular meeting and no plaque shall be placed or official announcement made prior to a final council vote. The intent to consider any naming shall be listed on the council agenda issued prior to the meeting.

If there are opportunities for the naming of portions of rooms and spaces in conjunction with the construction of a new building or new facility, or for furnishings for such buildings and /or facilities, no such opportunity shall be offered until the town council shall approve a list of naming opportunities and shall approve a minimum contribution for each naming opportunity. In such instances that this is being done in conjunction with a town council authorized fundraising effort; the town council's approval of the naming opportunity shall constitute the council's final approval of the actual name. The fundraising group may decline any contribution at its sole discretion.

Parkinson and the firm of Bergen Parkinson as primary alternative counsel when Monaghan Leahy has conflicts, to affirm the continuing appointment of Bruce A. Coggeshall and the firm of Pierce Atwood as bond counsel, to appoint Maurice A. Selinger, III as a continuing legal counsel on affordable housing issues and to authorize the town council chair in consultation with the town manager to procure any other additional legal counsel needed prior to a meeting with the understanding that any continuing appointment of any attorney serving the town shall be done by the full town council.
